PORT DOUGLAS, Utah, Mar. 11.—F/O Donald L. Payne, son of Mrs. H. D. Payne, Harbor, Ore., has been processed for discharge at the Fort Douglas garrison center. Payne, who served 48 months in the states as a pilot with the 48th Central Postal Directory, is authorized to wear the American Theatre ribbon, the Purple Heart medal and victory medal. He was commissioned in the 48th Central Postal Directory, March 11, 1945. Prior to entering the army on March 11, 1942, Payne was employed as truck driver at Harbor. He plans to start an airport of his own.

1945 AAA Payments Due, Says County Agent

Applications for payment under the 1945 AAA program are nearing completion, according to reports from the county agent's office. Seventy-five completed applications have been sent in for

payment, 50 are complete—now waiting for Charles Doyle's signature as county chairman; approximately 20 require more information from farmers so that they can be completed, and about 30 have been sent out to farmers for signatures, but have not been returned.

Farmers who expect to participate in the 1946 program must sign a farm plan, and estimate sheet before May 1, or they will not be eligible to file a report of performance and claim payment. Approximately 150 farmers have signed under the 1946 program and will be eligible for participation this year.

Coyotes Reported On Curry Co. Sheep Ranges

Residents of Squaw Valley have been hearing quite a number of coyotes on Canfield Hill recently, say O. P. Ferguson. Reports from other sources indicate that a similar condition exists at Lobster Hill. Some time ago Stanley Colgrove reported coyotes on North Fork of the Chetco, and Dick Adams, ex-government hunter, reports seeing considerable signs between Soldier Camp and Iron Mountain.

Apparently weather conditions during the past season have been responsible for causing more migration from eastern Oregon than usual. Eternal vigilance on the part of Curry county sheepmen holds losses at a minimum.

Regular meeting of the Azalea Garden Club at the Grange hall will be held Thursday, April 11, at 2 p. m. A cordial welcome is extended to the public.



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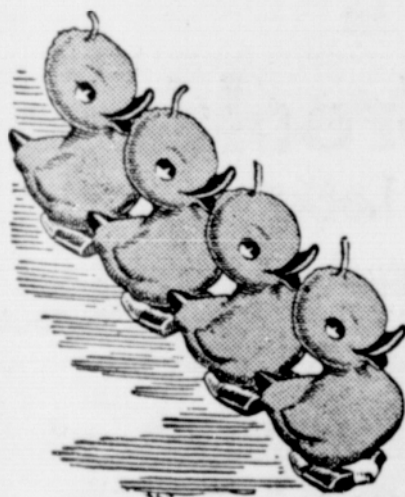
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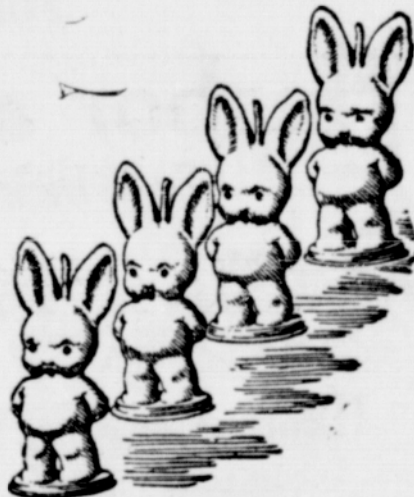
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
