David O. Selznick, who made "Gone With the Wind" and "Rebecca," two of the world's finest films has accomplished the impossible. He has repeated his brilliant success with a film which promises to transcend even the near-immortality of his two big motion pictures. It is "Since You Went Away," which Brookings may see, Sunday and Monday at the Pine Cone Theatre.

David O. Selznick is a name of which motion pictures can today be proud. For with that remarkably sweeping touch which is so markedly evident in his other great pictures, Selznick has put on the screen the very soul of America. More than a tale of the home front, which is its ostensible plot, "Since You Went Away" emerges, as Ben Hecht has put it, as a "song of America."

Yet the picture is by no means a "spectacle" film. A cast of seven stars: Claudette Colbert, Joseph Cotton, Jennifer Jones, Shirley Temple, Monty Woolley, Lionel Barrymore and Robert Walker, weaves from a simple and humble story of one family in America in time of war, a powerful and moving vehicle without recourse to the usual fireworks which one finds all too often in "Hollywood epics."
