

Vets May Obtain Medical Attention At Home Town

Legion Announces New Agreement With State Doctors

Post Commander V. A. Mendenhall Sr., has just received word from Neil Morfitt, department commander of the American Legion, that an agreement has been consummated between the Veterans' Administration and Oregon Physicians' Service for the furnishing of localized medical serv-

ice to veterans throughout the state of Oregon. Under this program, male veterans will be entitled to localized medical services for service-connected conditions, whereas female veterans will receive these localized medical services for service-connected ailments, as well as most non-service connected conditions. The rendering of these services requires individual authorization in advance from the Veterans Administration. It is understood that the new medical service arrangement for veterans in Oregon will be effective on and after April 1, 1946.

Under this program the veteran will be enabled to obtain authorized medical services from his family home-town doctor, in most instances. Oregon Physicians' Service, the medical service plan sponsored by the Oregon State Medical Society, maintains a current staff of approximately 800 physicians and surgeons located throughout the state of Oregon, and with affiliated physicians in every city and town in the state. This list of affiliated physicians and surgeons is being augmented steadily, due to the return of many physicians from the armed forces.

This new development in medi-

cal service arrangements in Oregon is in accordance with the announced policy of the Veterans Administration in making localized medical services available to veterans throughout the country in all states wherein medical service organizations are available for functioning under such a plan.

It is believed that veterans in Oregon will appreciate the opportunity to obtain these medical services in their home towns under the provisions of this program, said Earl Templar, service officer of Chetco Post, No. 138, Tuesday.

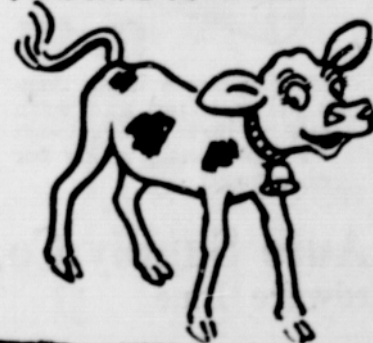
