

Pioneer Of Area Married Friday

Funeral services were held last Friday afternoon for Melvin Fitzhugh, Sr., grandson of one of the pioneers of Oregon, who died at Astoria, Tuesday. Services were held at the Baptist Community church.

Born in Douglas County, March 1871, with his parents, Mr. George Fitzhugh, he came to a Flores Creek ranch in northern tier of Curry County in 1873. Later they made their home on Sixes river, and still later moved to Harbor.

In 1896, Melvin married Adelia Lebebe, a county pioneer's daughter, and to this union were born: Iva, Diva, Peter, Lester, George, Raymond, George Beulah, Melvina and Melvin Jr., all of whom except Jesse, survive.

There are also several grandchildren. During his life, Mr. Fitzhugh was active in the development of the county, being in turn teacher, logger, seal hunter, and turning his hand as opportunity offered. His widow resides in the Harbor home, near the mouth of the Chetco river.

His father, George Fitzhugh, a small boy, accompanied his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Fitzhugh, by stages, from Kentucky, through Missouri, and later to settle in Douglas county in 1850.

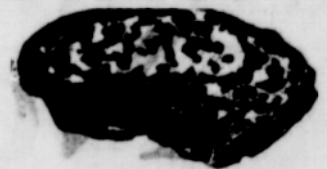
