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Community Is Not Afraid Of Progress!

Brookings is to be congratulated upon her actions, Monday evening, by voting overwhelmingly to build a new school building, in face of every and all obstacles at this particular time.

This action, to the Pilot, means one thing—Brookings faces the future with confidence—intends to progress with the remainder of the world, and at least abreast.

To obtain materials for such a structure certainly is going to be no small task. With labor as scarce in this area as it is right now, certainly that problem will demand considerable attention.

People who faced criticism from neighbors for voting taxes at this particular time are to be congratulated. Certainly they do not intend to stand in way of progress, to say nothing of the future they seek for the children of the community, years to come.

Opponents learned, Monday night, that they were not faced by weak-spined individuals. They (those who fight anything which might raise taxes) now know that schools must be built regardless of obstacles, and irrespective of personal beliefs.

People have censured those individuals—those members of the school board—blaming them for many things over which they have no control and for which they had no solution. The vote, Monday evening should be a token of the faith the district holds in their dispatch of duties, as well as a green flag for any action that may be necessary to realize this new school before the fall term begins.

The erection of the new school, alone, will entice more people to this area than anyone can now realize. People will come here with an assurance that they are moving to a community which has progressive spirit, and a will to advance.

Incorporation of Brookings, establishment of a bank, and the inauguration of twice-a-day, seven-days-a-week mail service, are the remaining steps necessary to put this area in the spot where it belongs among other Oregon communities. With the wealth and potential wealth here, these soon must follow.

Real estate transfers denote one of two things: either the community is growing, or it is dying. In growing communities, land prices are ascending, while on the other hand, dying communities would "give away" their property. Which is this area?

Your Right Is Sacred With Us

A few key easements, permitting solid staking of lines, have not as yet been signed. However, for the most part, response to the signing of easement is most satisfactory.

It should be kept in mind by those who have already signed easements, that they HAVE NOT signed away all their rights in saying where the electric lines will go on their property.

The property owner, having signed an easement, still has a voice and a right in the placing of lines, and the Co-op, thru the easements, does not stake out the lines at their discretion. The easement only gives the Co-op permission to place a power line on the property. The wishes of property owner are taken into consideration, and are determining factors in the placement of poles and lines.
