

Azalea Garden Club Announces Plans For Festival Flower Show, May 25th

Unusual interest is being shown in the Azalea Festival which will be held Saturday, May 25. Hundreds of flower-lovers, not only from all parts of Oregon and California, but from all over the United States, will come in quest of beauty.

Other wild flowers besides the gorgeous and fragrant Azaleas will greet the local floral guests. The blue lupine which grows here in deeper hues, the golden poppy, and the wild iris, violets and wild strawberries which border southwest Oregon highways will add to the loveliness of the Pacific coast.

The dogwood, and the purple wild lilac which enhance the shining green of the Smith River Canyon make a beautiful approach on Highway 199, while the Oregon Coast has seaward stretches of the pink huckleberry along with the blue lupine which is a sight in itself.

Supplementing this Azalea Festival, the Azalea Garden Club of Brookings and Harbor is preparing an elaborate display of the choices of garden flowers, from the gardens of Southern Oregon and Northern California.

Organizations, as well as individuals, will show in a wide variety of arrangements, their rare and lovely blooms.

Smith River, which has some of the oldest and most outstanding gardens, will be among the displays and the Illinois Garden Club of Cave City Junction, will also add to the loveliness displayed. Crescent City and Gold Beach also will share the beauty of all their gardens. Individuals not affiliated with any organization are urged to bring their prize garden flowers and help show guests at the festival just what they do in their flower gardens, and elsewhere on this page is an entry schedule to follow.
