Georgia Ann Shuster, according to word received here, died at her home at Talent, Saturday, May 28, at 8:15 p. m., following illness of five weeks. She had lived in Oregon 15 years and in the Wagner Creek community for the past 13 years. She was a member of the V. F. W. Auxiliary. Born in Missouri in 1854, she was 91 years, 7 months and 15 days at the time of her death. She was daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Swanson. Her late husband, Bingham Shuster, died on Dec. 3, 1935.
