

Sense And Some NONSENSE

"Aunties have a rare beauty," writes Mrs. T. N. Averill, publisher of the Townsend Star, at Townsend, Mont., in an editor, last week, in commenting on the Azalea Festival, which she should have seen. Mrs. Averill, in her 80s, has been editor and with her two daughters, have published the Star many years, since the death of Mr. Averill. They have done a creditable job of it, and have been mentioned in a number of printing trade journals.

Coming to Townsend in the 30s as a bride, Mrs. Averill has seen many generations of citizens of Brookings county. Mountain, come in to go, and with a philosophy of life that is amazing, Mrs. Averill laments in her letter to the Pilot that they had seen no lilies in two years. Her favorite is *Lilium*, of *Solima*.

Another remark of hers that rings in "It must be wonderful to live where you have no fear of frost, and where you can see all kinds of flowers—that rare beauty of the azaleas, and the lilies. We have had no lilies in two years, and the mild weather has killed many of our roses—our lilies froze and many of our fruit trees were nipped."

Some local growers, seeking a small market, might contact Mrs. T. N. Averill, at Townsend, Mont., who would, in turn, approve the growers of lilies who might be seeking some of the bulbs which this country grows with abandon. Being on the exchange list of the Pilot, the Townsend Star here enjoys reading about this country, its rare opportunity, its unusual agriculture. Through an exchange of papers, this market may be expanded in that section of the country, perhaps now ignored by western bulb growers.

It was quite interesting, Saturday evening, for Mrs. Albers and I to make estimations of the crowd which might have attended the festival had not the rain and threatening weather dissipated enthusiasm toward making a trip here.

Certainly, if the Azalea Festival is to become a national event, a permanent organization must be set up to carry on, not for a month or so prior to an event, but during the entire year. An organization similar to the Rosarians at Portland, or the Cherrians at Salem, might be the solution.

Under such an organization, it will be possible to establish national contacts which will mean more to the future of this vicinity than any other one particular resource. It could be worked out along the suggested line.

Select a board, each of which would have specific duties such as would be necessary in such plan. For instance, one person, whose acquaintances live in many leading west coast cities, might be general chairman. He would

appoint a publicity director who would contact all publications, to furnish such pictures and copy, necessary for the promotion of the event. The Pilot would suggest that Ralph Vincent be made either general chairman or head of the publicity, because of his outside contacts. Mr. Crissey, also because of his contacts, might be an important figure in this organization.

Under an organization, perhaps to be known as the Azaleas, it would be possible to have competition heats, have displays of our flowers, perhaps under direction of the local garden club, and with a committee to furnish entertainment of all kinds. It will be possible for such organization to build a hall to house much of this event.

Properly planned, such an event could be made to finance all the necessary building and equipment. This building, if the community would care to aid in the financing, could be made sufficiently large as to house a community hall of some sort. It may also be built with view of housing such lodges as the proposed Masonic lodge, the Legion and other such organizations which might care to assume part of the financial load.

The Pilot is not able to draw up specific plans for such an organization, but knows of several in the community who could do this job well. This project should be given study, and personal expression should be made through these columns.

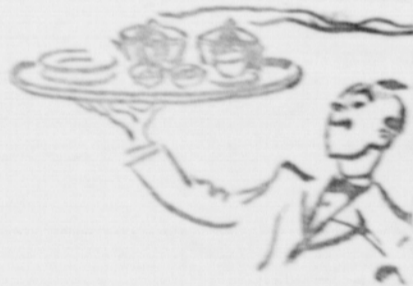
