If you are 18 years of age, or older, get your mail at Brookings, Harbor, Pistol River, or Smith River post office, drop the Pilot a card, with your full name, address, and post office address at which you were born. If a married lady, between your given and your husband's last name enter your maiden name: Thus—

Mrs. Mary (Jones) Smith, Harbor, born at Rock Cliff, Wyo. Beginning with the June 27 issue of the Pilot, names received will be published in the following groups, one group a week. Delay has been made so as to give every reader a chance to send a card with his name and address, and also to allow time for the person (if not already on the list) to come in to subscribe to the Pilot, so as not to miss a listing of people from your home state.

The first group on each weekly list will be the native Webbs (Oregonians)—get your names in quickly, so it will be easy to compile the list. And the rest of you folks—backward Aksarbens, those from the state that's round at both ends and high in the middle, Hoosiers, Down Easters, those who got away from California or Texas, those from the spud state—let's have your cards, thick and fast, so you won't be left out—AND BE SURE TO SEND COMPLETE DATA—we can't make corrections and want to get you lined up right with others from your state.

North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida; 6. Kentucky, Tennessee, Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi; 7. Texas, Oklahoma; 8. Missouri, Arkansas; 9. North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa; 10. Minnesota, Michigan, Wisconsin; 11. Montana, Wyoming; Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico; 12. Washington State; 13. California, Utah, Nevada; 14. Ohio, Illinois, Indiana; 15. Those born outside the United States.
