plenty early to sow some of the main garden crops in case these are not already in and growing, reminds R. M. Knox, county agent. The world famine situation is such that every pound of food raised in a home garden will not insure better living for the gardener but will release that much commercial food for use elsewhere.

In some respects this has been a discouraging garden year in Oregon because of the wet early spring and the extremely dry late spring, but on soils that still have a good moisture supply or where irrigation is available, gardens planted now will still produce a good supply of staple vegetables.

Here are some of the vegetables which can still be planted, with suggested dates in western Oregon; appropriate adjustment is needed for higher elevations:

Tomatoes—These can still be put out if good plants are avail-

able. Probably the most popular single garden crop, tomatoes are heavy producers and rich in vitamins.

Peppers—These like hot summer weather so will still do well.

Celery—A succession planting from the middle of June on is a good idea.

Cauliflower—Plants are usually set out the last half of June.

Cabbage—plants for the late crop are set out the last half of June.

Brussell Sprouts—This vegetable, rich in minerals and vitamins, makes a good fall and winter crop when planted out the last half of June.

Scoth Curled Kale—Here is another crop set out in late June that provides greens more rich than spinach all winter in some parts of Oregon.

Sweet Corn—Plant in block plants up to middle of June.

Bush Beans—plenty of time for these to bear if planted in June.

Carrots and Beets—both these root crops will do well planted early in June, also late or main crop potatoes.

Winter squash—These will still mature if planted soon.

A good supply of fertilizers, especially nitrogen and phosphate will be assured a good crop before late fall.
