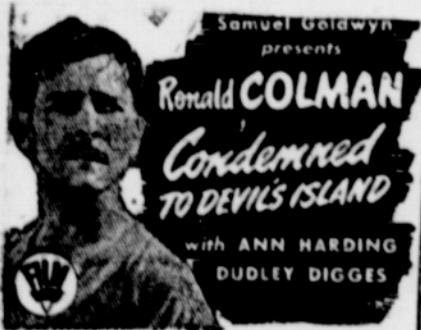
An ice cream cabinet was installed, Tuesday, at the Chetco Cafe.

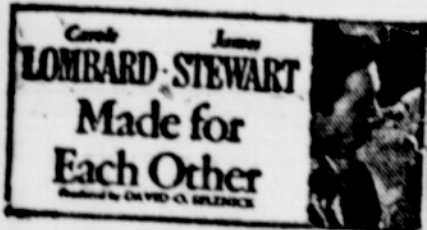

A Letter

Members of Coos Electric Co-op:

We are indeed sorry we have been unable to have more than just gotten under construction. It was our plan not to only have started, but completed all construction necessary in this community in the first six months we were in operation here.

The delay has been a combination of several things: primary of which is materials. All our materials have been ordered many months — some were received in just few months following placement of orders. On some, we were told that the orders would be filled, shipped and received in 60 to 90 days. We have since been told on these same orders that shipment will be indefinite, due to strikes. Since then, future dates have been quoted to us.

We have started a new phase of construction, and we hope articles needed will come so that we may continue working until the job is complete.
