LAST OF THE MIXES—

PASTRY MIX

12 cups sifted flour.
1 1/2 tblsp. salt.
3 cups (1 1/2 lbs.) lard.
Sift flour and salt together. Cut in one-half of fat until like cornmeal. Blend in remaining lard until size of small peas. If you use any other fat than lard, increase to four cups.

PIE CRUST: Measure 2 1/2 cups

mix, add 4 to 6 tabbsp. ice water, a teaspoon at a time. Mix lightly with fork until mixture can be shaped into ball, roll each ball into rounds, 1/4" thick, and fit into pie tins. Makes two 8-inch crusts or one 9-inch crust with lattice top, or six 3-inch tarts. Bake tarts or shell at 450 degrees, F.

PASTRY PRETZELS: Roll left-casserole with pastry. Alternate beaten egg and cream. Cut into 6-inch strips, tie into knots, sprinkle with coarse salt, grated cheese celery, or poppy seeds. Bake 10 minutes at 450.

MEAT POT PIE: Line a deep casserole with pastry. Alternate layers of cooked and cut: white or sweet potatoes, carrots, celery, mild onion, meat. Season, add 1/2 cup gravy, cover with crust, seal edges. Bake in 400 oven for 45 minutes.

PEANUT PASTRY SQUARES: Beat 2 egg yolks, blend with 1/4 cup sugar and 2 1/2 cups pastry mix. Pat into the bottom of a 7x12-inch pan. Top with meringue made of two stiffly-beaten egg whites and 1/2 cup chopped peanuts. Bake at 500 degrees, 25 minutes. Makes 24 squares.

I sincerely hope these mixes have found a permanent place on your pantry shelf. They're so delicious, yet such time savers.

Continued rain and cloudiness may be good for the lilies but from appearance of my bean patch I'd say the reverse is the case. Mine are covered with rust.

Now, I don't pretend to be a good gardener. I'm just an amateur trying to raise a good garden; so, of course, when a problem confronts me I consult Mr. and Mrs. Bush Brown about it. Their volume "America's Garden Book" is excellent (listed in the Montgomery Ward catalog for \$3.39). They say to dust the beans with sulphur. (I'm amateur all right! I didn't know the difference between dusting sulphur and flowers of sulphur, so I had to look that up. Briefly, the difference is only a matter of degree of pulverizing. The fine dusting sulphur adheres to the foliage better than the ordinary sulphur. It is used to control rust and mildew and may be combined with arsenate of lead and nicotine. Apply in late afternoon or evening if used on tender or delicate foliage (Hm, now I'm wondering if beans are delicate and where I can get the dusting sulphur).
