## Rosacker Company Doubles Size Of Local Greenhouse

### Work Completed By W. P. Clement; To Parallel First Plant

The space under glass at the Brookside Azalea and Bulb Farm has been doubled by the new house just completed, according to Lawrence Pinson, local manager for the parent firm, Hans Hosacker Co., of Minneapolis, Minn. The new structure was built by W. P. (Spider) Clement and is a testimonial to his craftsmanship as the building of a greenhouse, from the ground up, is considered the art of specialists. "Spider" states that he glazed the whole house in ten days, keeping three men busy handing him glass and reloading putty guns.

Inside the building are eight beds, placed on the surface of the ground, each bed 5 X 100. These beds will be used for the rooting of azalea cuttings, of which an initial 50,000 have been ordered from the east, according to Pinson. Most of these will be of varieties not now grown here, otherwise cuttings could be taken from the locally grown stock, of which Pinson has successfully rooted many thousand, now growing on, out of doors. When the azaleas are ready for marketing, they are dug, packed, and shipped to florists who pot and force them for the trade. Many thousand are shipped from the local plant each year over wide territory.

The new structure, running parallel to the one built four years ago, will later be fitted with its sprinkling system as well as a couple of oil heaters for use in extreme cold weather.

The materials used in the new building were shipped here, some years before the war, from the firm in Minneapolis, they were confident then that their venture here would pay. Their experience has justified their convictions that this area will profitably produce other floral merchandise than lillies.
