We believe we all had a little too much enthusiasm and high hopes of what the end of the war would do in relieving all difficulties in procuring "ard to get items."

In passing the new poles, installed between Harbor and the state line, on Highway 101, it will be noticed that there are long spaces where poles are missing. This is due to the fact that we do have the materials needed to complete the line in those places.
