Yes-mam! Blackberry Pie Would Be Good!

The wild blackberry season is now here and many local people have been seen along the roads and highways the past week, picking the first luscious fruit. Many uses have been found for this plentiful fruit, and here are a few tested recipes:

BLACKBERRY JAM
6 cups blackberries
½ cup water 6 cups sugar
Juice of two oranges
Juice of one lemon
Grated rind of one orange
Cook berries with water until soft. Rub through sieve and add sugar, fruit juice, and grated rind. Boil until thick. Pour into sterilized glasses and seal with paraffin. (Makes 6 6-oz. glasses).

BLACKBERRY-APPLE JELLY
Wash blackberries; add 1 cup water to each 4 quarts fruit; heat gradually until color fades from pulp; mash while cooking. Strain juice through wet, double cheesecloth or cotton flannel bag. Remove blemishes from apples; cut but don't core or pare. Add water just to cover; simmer until soft. Strain as above. For each batch of jelly, measure 1½ cups apple juice and ½ cup blackberry juice; bring to boiling; skim. add one-third cup sugar; stir until sugar dissolves. Cook rapidly until jelly sheets from spoon. Pour into sterilized glasses; cover with paraffin. Makes three 6-oz. glasses. For best results make jelly in small batches.—Joan Byrne.
