

Man Takes Own Life On North Bank of Smith River

Despondent Over His Health, Reported By Relatives

BROOKINGS — Raymond E. Smith, 42 years old, was found dead early Saturday morning in his car, parked off the highway in the redwoods, on the north bank of Smith River. He had taken his own life with a revolver, according to Sheriff Martin Huffman. Smith, a berry picker, about 7 a. m., was reported to the sheriff. He was survived by a sister, Mrs. Stella Alphaugle, of Weott, Calif. Relatives reported he had been despondent over ill health.
