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The Pioneer Spirit To The Fore

Last week, to call attention to the predicament the school board now finds itself—held up by lack of plans, and such—concerning construction of the new school building, together with repair of the old, the Pilot suggested that everyone in the community donate several days labor toward this goal. The results of that suggestion overwhelms the Pilot, so some of the readers come forward with counter-suggestions.

Several skilled men of the community have come forward with offers to donate not only their valuable time, but also that of equipment. Fully co-operative throughout the community, already this could mean up to 750 man-days, which, when saved from the taxpayers pocket-books, might mean something of a sizeable sum.

Take for instance: common labor, at \$1.00 per hour (they pay that for weeding lilies) that would mean a saving of \$6,000.00 in labor costs alone. Where else could a taxpayer reduce his taxes more in that length of time?

Too many of us like to sit back and do some "side-line coaching"—we like to point out faults of the school board in the actions about this or that. If each person in the community were to pitch in, do some manual labor toward erection of this new school, then not only would the building rise more quickly, but with less criticism from the people as a whole. Maybe it is old-fashioned to do this in a community enterprise way—but nevertheless, sometimes the old-fashioned ways have proved best. Think it over and fill in the application blank elsewhere in this issue.

In unity there is strength—stick together on all matters of civic interest and this area will grow!

FARM NEWS

CAKE AT LAMB SHOW

Final preparations for the 11 annual Curry County Lamb and Wool Show are under way at Gold Beach this week, according to Mrs. Hudkins, president of the Gold Beach Womens club. A free luncheon is to be served at noon, contributed by local people. All housewives are asked to bring cake in accordance with the pre-war custom.

Sheepmen are furnishing 12 fat lambs to be barbecued at the Gold Beach Bakery while merchants and business men from all parts of the county are contributing to the coffee and other supplies to make up the luncheon. The bakery donated 50 loaves of bread.

Due to transportation and labor difficulties the lamb show was discontinued during the war on a county-wide basis. Although sheepmen are all very busy at this time of the year the fair board members urge them to make a special effort to see that a good exhibit is on display. Classes with large premiums have been provided for pens of five fat lambs, totaling \$150. Fat singles and fleece classes have been provided and listed in detail in the premium list which was mailed out this week. The program for Saturday, July 20, also outlined in detail, provides that all entries must be on display at 10 a. m. so that judging can be started at 10:30. Registered sheep breeders have been invited to exhibit breeding stock and breeders will have an opportunity to exchange registered bucks.

PRESIDENT'S PROCLAMATION

Whereas an increased supply of food is vitally needed to promote peace and happiness in the post-war world; and

Whereas farm accidents rob the nation of thousands of lives and millions of dollars worth of food and other property each year; and

Whereas experience in previous observances of National Farm Safety Week has clearly shown the necessity and benefits of a co-ordinated and constant edu-

cational farm-safety program.

Now, therefore, I, Harry S. Truman, president of the United States of America, do hereby call upon the nation to observe the week, commencing July 21, 1946, as National Farm Safety Week.

And I request all persons and organizations concerned with agriculture and farm life to do everything in their power to discover and publish the facts about farm accidents, and to develop practical safety program which farm people everywhere can translate into direct action against hazards which daily threaten their lives and happiness. As a start, I specifically suggest that the farm people of the country observe National Farm Safety Week by resolving to eliminate at least one hazard a day until their farms are as safe as they can possibly make them.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington this twenty-seventh day of April, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-six, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and seventieth.
