

Inspection Is Completed Here

A. L. Geiger, Deputy State cultural inspector who has been assigned for inspection work in Curry County, reports that he has just completed field inspection work. He is leaving a supply of application blanks with the officers of three local associations, and at the County Agent's office in Gold Beach. These application forms are available upon request. A nurseryman's license required by law when growers sell more than fifty dollars worth of plants per year. The nurseryman's fee is five dollars and it covers a grower of one-half acre of plants. The increasing rate is now up to twenty-five dollars depending upon the size of the plants.
