Vets Information Given At Colleges

An information center, to keep Oregon world war 2 veterans posted on educational and housing facilities in all state and independent colleges and universities in Oregon will soon be set up in the department of veterans' affairs, at Salem, it is announced.

At a meeting at Salem last week of officials of the majority of Oregon's colleges, called by Supt. of Public Instruction Rex Putnam, it was decided that such an information center should be established, and Edward T. Taggart, education officer of the department of veterans' affairs, was named co-ordinator.

All schools of higher learning will fill out forms and return them to the department of veterans' affairs office, listing the housing facilities available and the types of courses and instruction which can be offered incoming students.

When the information is compiled, it will be sent back to all the schools, and also to every veterans' guidance center in the state, so that veterans can be informed at all times as to their chances of getting college entry.

Putnam said it is expected that the states adjacent to Oregon will adopt the same plan, and an interchange of information will be maintained so that if all colleges in Oregon are filled, for example, it may be possible to direct local veterans to school openings in Idaho or Washington, or other states.

This information plan, according to Putnam, was proposed by the U. S. office of education so that eventually every veterans' service center in the nation will have an up-to-date picture of the college housing and curriculum situation.

School officials attended the session from the University of Oregon, Oregon State College, Willamette University, University of Portland, Pacific University, Reed College, Marylhurst College, Mt. Angel College, Multnomah College, Oregon College of Education and Lewis and Clark College.

Dairy Show Billed For August 11th

The annual picnic and dairy show has been scheduled at Floras Creek bridge on August 11, according to H. S. Cadman, president of Curry County Dairymens Association.
