Compost Study Is Made By R. Sloan

Robert Sloan, who lives north of Brookings, has been studying compost and its relation to the lily industry since he was discharged from the army air corps. Already, he has made many discoveries, which, as he states, are vital to the future of the lily industry.

"Commercial fertilizers are injurious to the soil, especially if bud count is expected from the commercial lilies we expect to sell," he told the Pilot Monday while asking permission to write a weekly column concerning compost.

Mr. Sloan is ready to back up every statement of his with facts from scientists who have made a study through research. He, in a small way, has been carrying on experiments of his own, and is now about to enter upon a venture of manufacturing compost for sale to everyone in the area.

"I have sold some land, I am selling a light plant, and everything I can turn into money, to get this enterprise under way. Frankly, I see no other way for the lily industry to survive and hold the position it deserves unless growers heed the laws of nature, and do away with use of injurious commercial fertilizers."
