Roto-tiller Makes Plow Obsolete For Certain Kinds of Farm Work, Claim

The new Roto-tiller farm machine produced by Ham-Paige Motors Corp., and sold locally thru Ham Motors, Box 185, Coquille, is the first agricultural machine of its kind to be produced in volume. The production schedule at Willow Run plant called 2000 units.

The versatile, self-powered implement prepares for immediate planting in a single operation by mixing and crumbling the ground with rapidly-moving steel tines, or edge tools. It produces a thoroughly-worked seed bed than can be obtained in several operations with disc, plow, and harrow, Wm. E. Sullivan, who heads the local committee, stated.

In addition to its primary purpose of soil tillage, attachments soon to be available will make the Roto-tiller adaptable to planing or seeding, and lawn-mowing. A power take-off makes the machine a portable power plant to operate saws and other farm machinery.

Powered by a two-cycle, five-horsepower engine, the Roto-tiller Power Tiller is adjustable for both deep and shallow tilling, and performs the work differently than a plow by mixing the earth in a paddle-like fashion rather than simply turning it over, Sullivan said. The new machine distributes cover crops and fertilizers uniformly throughout the seed bed so that plant roots are provided with a food supply as they continue to grow.
