Price Trends Seem Right To Prof.

People of this area who have long been skeptical of the lily business, of the price trend and prospects for the future, were given a real insight of the future by Prof. DeLoasch, of Oregon State College, who Monday evening, explained economic trends of the present day.

Quoting from the first inaugural address of late President Roosevelt, "The only thing to fear is fear itself," he explained that the industry, properly managed, would be stable for all time, with a general trend upward, if growers adhered to certain correct cultural principles.

He predicted that the "good" growers would always prosper, and the "poor" growers would drop by the wayside due to poor practices.

American people, he emphasized, like quality, and where quality is to be found, little question is likely to be raised about the price.

Especially noteworthy in his address to the lily growers was his plea for co-operative selling, of the unity that is necessary for existence in this highly competitive world of today.

"The small growers, through co-operative action, are as large growers, only that the small growers are in better position to put on the market a better product," he said in closing.
