Favorite Recipe

Mrs. Charles Christenson of Brookings submits the favorite recipe this week:

CARROT PUDDING
1 cup grated raw carrot
1 cup grated raw potato
1 cup sifted flour.
1 cup white sugar.
1/2 cup seeded raisins.
1/2 cup currants.
1/2 cup butter.
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
1 teaspoon soda in 1/2 cup grate potao saved until last and added last of all. Flour the fruit well and steam three hours. Serve with lemon sauce.

Lemon Sauce
1 lemon. 1 cup sugar
4 tablesspoons water
1 teaspoon butter.
4 teaspoon cornstarch.
Boil sugar, then add cornstarch and butter, lastly the lemon, also grated rind. Serve at once. Vinegar is sometimes added to season.
