## Fair Concessions To Be Run By Vets

GOLD BEACH—Arrangements have been completed by the Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars of Curry county to participate in a three-county recreational program which is also sponsored and supported by the Curry County Fair Board.

The Gold Beach organizations have invited veteran committees from Coos and Del Norte counties to participate in a planning. Mayor O. L. Wood, of Coquille, has agreed to meet with the group and to bring official representatives from the Rotary club of that city and committees of the veterans organizations to participate in this program.

Curry county veterans organizations will handle all concessions at the fair, set for Aug. 30 and 31. The tentative program includes games of chance, food booths, entertainment concessions, foot races, square dance contests between Granges and a queen entertainment program, sponsored by the Curry County Pomona Grange, as a contest supporting participation in the fair. The Gold Beach chamber of commerce has agreed to entertain the queen and her court which includes an up-river boat excursion.

Veterans will also plan a long-time development recreational program involving smokers, and carnival equipment to be used in Coos, Curry and Del Norte counties, at fairs and other community recreational functions including regattas, the Azalea Festival, fairs, rodeos, and July 4th celebrations. The Gold Beach community band will furnish music at these events and plans a future expansion program which will be a credit to any community.
