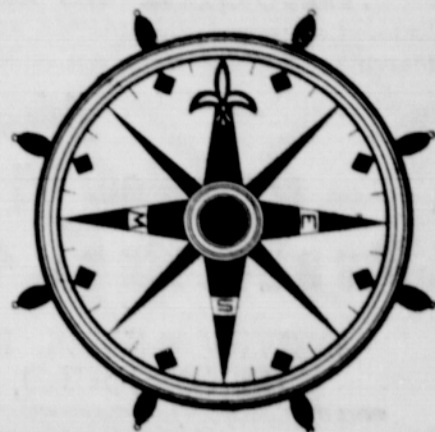

World-Famous Scout Leader Will Be In Area, Wednesday, September 11th

Oscar A. Kirkham, of Salt Lake, Will Speak at Special Meeting, Billed at Chetco Grange Hall

Oscar A. Kirkham, prominent Salt Lake City, will give an address, Wednesday evening, September 11, at Harbor Grange hall, as has been announced by local scout committeemen.

Will Visit Area

For some years Mr. Kirkham served as chief executive of the Salt Lake council, and in 1925 was appointed associate regional executive of Region 12, comprising California, Arizona, Utah, Nevada and the Hawaiian Islands. On five different occasions he served as chief morale officer at world Scout Jamborees, twice in England, once in Hungary, once in Holland and once at Washington, D. C.

Largely through his efforts as a director of Scouting in the Mormon church, that organization today has a larger percentage of its boys enrolled in scouting than has any other religious body.

In 1920 he was appointed executive secretary of the Young Men's Mutual Improvement association of the church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, occupying this position until his appointment in 1941 to the First Council of the Seventy of the Church, the body responsible for directing Mormon missionary activities in all the world.

The time set for the meeting is 7:30 p. m. and the entire community is urged to come out to his Mr. Kirkham. Boys interested in scouting, especially, are invited to come.

Packing Sheds To Open With Coming Bulb Harvest

Co-op Announces Packing, Sorting Shed Schedules, and Spots

According to T. A. Perkins, of the West Coast Bulb Growers, all packing sheds to be manned by the co-op will be opened to the public. For convenience of bulb growers of this area and the two northern California counties, the following spots have been named: Shed 1—Brookings, in what is known as the "mess hall" building, west of the highway in the town of Brookings.

Shed 2—at Crescent City, in the Poultry Exhibit building at the county fair grounds.

Shed No. 3—at McKinleyville, half mile north of the store on east side of highway 101, on the Brauer place.

Growers will bring their bulbs to the closest packing shed in field boxes plainly marked on the end with name of the grower, variety of bulb and estimated number and size of bulb. A memorandum receipt will be given the grower, setting forth the number of boxes and estimated contents. This will be subject to verification when the lot is packed.

The co-op urges that growers do not send in under-sized bulbs, diseased bulbs or yearlings.

Harvest will start soon after Sept. 1, or as soon as it is deemed time to start.

Carl C. Donough Paid Visit To Area Monday Morning

Democratic Candidate For Governor Amazed At Progress in Area

Carl C. Donough, of Portland, Democratic candidate for governor of Oregon, and his traveling companion, paid this area a visit Monday morning, while doing a little campaigning.

He visited Dr. A. O. Schmitt, whom he knew while Dr. Schmitt lived at Portland, and was shown about the area by him. Mr. Donough, like so many who have not seen the area for some time, was amazed almost beyond, as he put it, "words to express it" at the progress which had been made in this area in the past three years.

He showed especial interest in the growth of the area in face of handicaps due to sufficient rail or truck transportation.

He hinted that all Oregon must be brought into realization of the importance of the area in southwestern part of the state. When apprised of the fact, he was surprised to know that this area, through that fact, had become more a part of California than a part of the state in which it paid its taxes.

Following the accident Davison was arrested and brought before Judge A. E. Sandbo, where he pleaded guilty to a charge of operating his automobile on the wrong side of the road, and paid a fine for this offense.
