## A Message For You

Now is the time to take every possible step in the preparation of your soil for planting. Remember, one whole year of hard work and toil lies ahead—not to mention the investment. A very large part of the success or failure of your year's work depends upon what you do or don't do within the next few weeks, before planting. These are a few questions and answers about the work done by 5-foot SEAMAN TILLER:

Q. What is the advantage of having soil tilled?

A. Complete tillage means finer pulverization. Finely pulverized soil holds more moisture and holds it longer. Not to say that soil tilled would have a tendency to drain poorly because pulverized soil rid itself of excell moisture but retains the most beneficial percentage for crop growth.

Q. What about AERATION?

A. It is an established fact that the most potent factor governing nitrification of soil is the supply of air. Te revolving tines of the Seaman tiller dig and throw the soil against the machine, bringing air with the finely pulverized soil to the tillage. This increases the activity of the soil bacteria and consequently the efficiency of the fertilizer.

It also helps maintain higher soil temperature.

Q. Does it help in the control of weeds and other pests?

A. Yes! Those who have had their soil tilled in previous years say that the loose soil cuts their time in weeding over one-half, makes hoeing and cultivating much easier. Field mice, moles and gopher runways that are within the depth of the tillage (10 to 12 inches) are destroyed. Often the pests themselves are destroyed while in the runways.

Q. Is this tiller service expensive?

A. It is expensive not to take advantage of this service. For this tremendous improvement in soil preparation costs by the hour approximate \$15.00 per acre.
