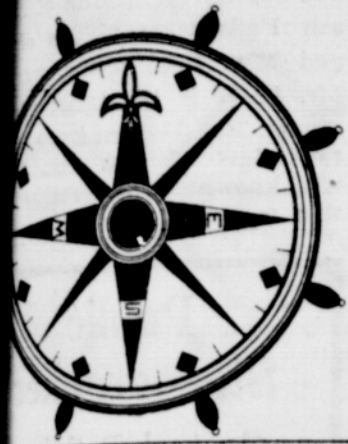
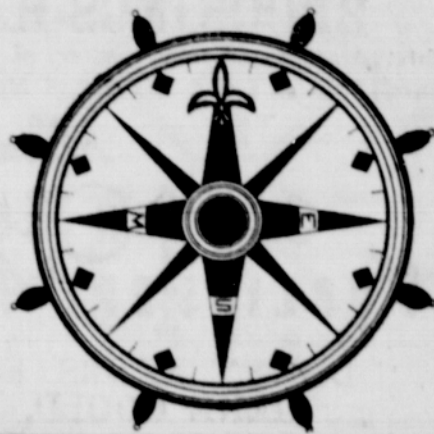

Baseball Team To Be Studied By Local C. Of C.

Azalea Festival Plans Were Made Laid At Organization, Wed.

Mr. J. Lesmeister, local real-estate agent, was appointed as chairman of the committee by the chamber of commerce last Wednesday evening to study and make recommendations for a baseball team to represent this area next season.

Mr. Lesmeister will contact local school authorities to see if a high school athletic field may be used, and make a survey of the available material for the next year.

An express office for the area, to be handled in conjunction with the local bus depot, was another item discussed by the chamber. The committee reports were made.

Form Permanent Organization
At a meeting, held last evening, this paper went to press, delegates of all local organizations met at the Central Building to form a permanent Azalea Festival organization, which will be responsible each year for the annual Azalea Festival. Details, and committee personnel will be published in next issue.

Coop Held Meeting Tuesday Evening

General business matters concerning the forthcoming bulb harvest were discussed Tuesday evening at Harbor Grange, by local members of the West Coast Bulb Growers, when the board of directors also were present.

With about 75 local members present, explanation of the bulb growing, etc., were explained. T. A. Perkins, manager for the co-op, will have direct charge of the bulb shed, with local people doing the grading and packing.

The Brookings packing shed will open next Monday, Sept. 9. Perkins told the Pilot yesterday while in Brookings.

The booklets, given out at the Del Norte County fair, were acclaimed as about the best advertising that has been given the organization. Some 400 of these booklets were given growers.

Forest Fire Danger Not Yet Over, Says Nance

"Dangers of the forest fires are not from being over, despite the rain, and quite often foggy weather we've been having," said Mr. Nance late last week, to the Pilot. "Until the fall rains come, we will have that danger." Mr. Nance, through co-operation of the neighborhood, have been running a series of advertisements in the Pilot, pointing out the dangers of forest fires.

To this area, a forest fire would be just about the worst catastrophe that could happen, inasmuch as so much of the future depends upon the stand of timber in the area.

Pilot Has Completed First Half-Year's Work

With this issue, the Pilot begins its second half year of publication, with number 27 issue.

The first six months has seen Pilot circulation reach out until it sends 30 papers to Portland, a like number to Crescent City, and Gold Beach. Eugene, Langlois, Port Orford and Klamath Falls have sizeable packages of Pilots each week. Circulation, even at but a fraction of the gain in the first six months, will exceed 1200 by the end of the first year of publication.
