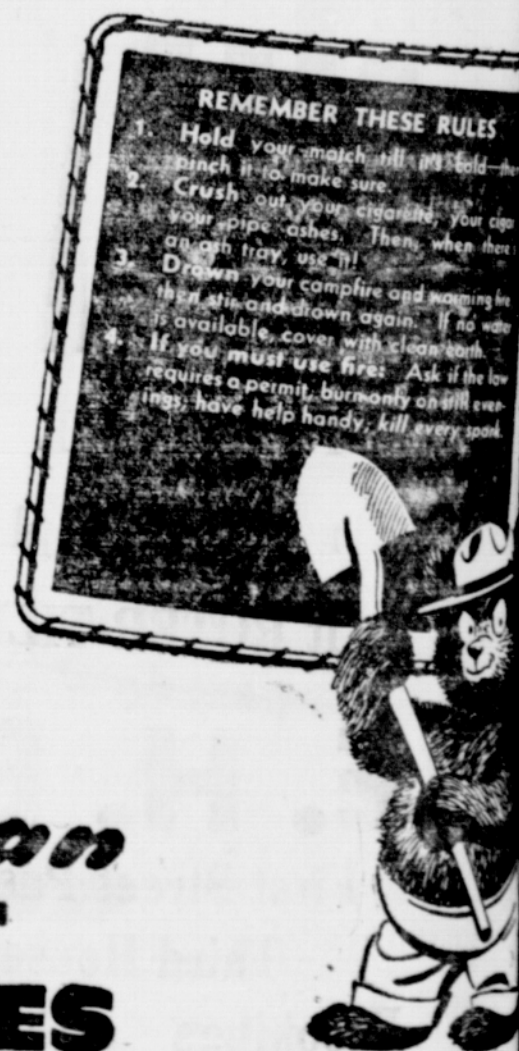

REMEMBER THESE RULES

1. Hold your match till it's hot—don't pinch it to make sure.
2. Crush out your cigarette, you can't see your pipe ashes. Then, when there's an ash tray, use it!
3. Drawn your campfire and burning in the rain and draw again. If no water is available, cover with clean earth.
4. If you must use fire: Ask if the law requires a permit, burn only on well-kept areas, have help handy, kill every spark.

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
