

Brookings Girls Hurt In Accident

SMITH RIVER—Miss Rose Potocnick and Mrs. Carole Lee Crockett, both of the Brookings-Harbor area, are confined to Knapp hospital at Crescent City, suffering from cuts and bruises as result of an automobile accident last week at Brogan's corner, just west of here, when the car in which they were riding with Jim Carson of Brookings, was struck by a coupe driven by D. L. O'Neil, of Brookings, headed north about 8 p. m. O'Neil was said to have been driving on the wrong side of the road and without lights.

The girls received severe cuts and bruises. Miss Crockett was thrown through the windshield, and was cut severely on her face and nose. Miss Potocnick received severe cuts on her legs from glass. Both were rushed to Knapp hospital where their wounds were dressed. Both are reported doing well.

Carson was badly shaken up but was uninjured. Alfred Morrison who was following O'Neil at the time of the accident, took O'Neil to Brookings for first aid to his broken left arm. Both cars were badly wrecked and had to be towed to Buckner's garage.

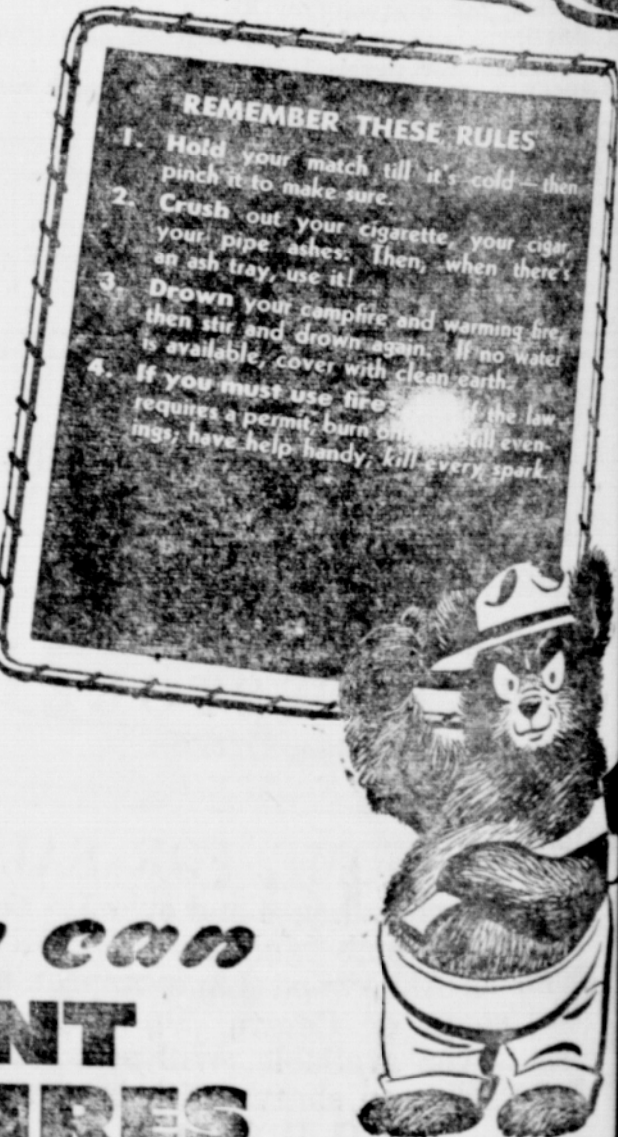
