Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Halliday and daughter, Norma, of Eugene, were week-end guests of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Berger.

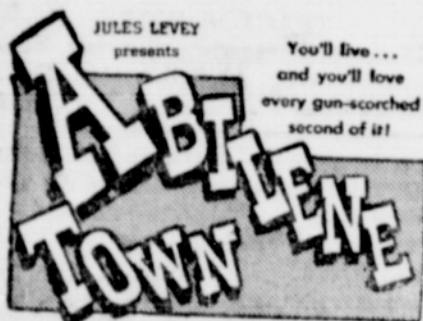
