People of Brookings have no idea of knowing what the people underwent while traveling the plains by way of the mooners, but Tuesday afternoon they were given a reasonable facsimile, when Orville Ewing Pritchett, Colo., came in his ox pitted against the north of two burrows, lugging a 1946 version of the prairie dog.

Traveling about 10 miles a day, the feed situation is not too good, Pritchett has an old auto rigged up with a canopy, which is inscribed "The Old Still Lives." Naturally, he is in front of Freeman's Store, fed his animals and with the crowd, selling his

pictorial post cards. To the rear of his caravan were tied two burros, and two or three goats which furnished him some of his daily fare in way of milk.

This touring menagerie has traveled from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Canada to the Mexican border. The 1700-lb, 9-year-old ox is shod with detachable leather shoes, and his donkeys were shod with rubber instead of the usual steel.

An artist, he became ill in his younger life, and for reason of health began in 1938 to roam. The first goal was the San Francisco world's fair, and to which place it a required a whole year to reach. Since then he has roamed in a criss-cross pattern over the United States.
