

# Olds Due Dental Meet The Faculty!

## For One Year

World war 2 veterans are entitled to dental care for one year after discharge from active duty, government expense through Veterans Administration, according to information received from Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs this week.

Veterans were advised that they should first contact the Veterans Administration regional office at 10th SW 10th, Portland, to ascertain their need for dental treatment.

It is in accord with recent regulations of the VA, which provide that within one year after discharge, a veteran's faulty teeth can have them repaired at expense of the Veterans Administration, without need of dental proof that the fault was incurred.

In many instances, VA officials believe it will be possible for that to authorize dental treatment through the veteran's own dentist. His dentist will be required to apply for and fill out a VA form, in order to be covered by the Veterans Administration. The patient will fill out Form 2827, and "Request for Denial."

These forms are available either at VA field offices, at the Portland regional office, from veterans' officers, or at the Portland offices of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Teeth which are determined by VA dental examiners to need treatment, will be repaired by the patient's dentist in turn bills the Veterans Administration.

These veterans out of military service more than a year also may have their own dentists' services at expense, but only for ailments which were service incurred. In other words, those teeth which the veterans' service records show to have had treatment during time of service.
