#### FIRE EQUIPMENT

A hunting party should have a minimum of fire equipment in. It's needed anyhow for purpose than putting out. The minimum needs are:

**Axe.** It should be sharp— less than 26 inches in length, with head weighing two or over. If preferred, use ski; it's a more useful tool.

**Shovel.** It should be not less than 36 inches long overall with pointed head not less than 4 inches wide.

**Water Container.** A bucket or bag with a capacity of 5 gallons or more.
