PORTLAND—Gold is where you find it—but there was no gold in a specimen of ore from the claim where the Crescent City gold rush got its start, an assayer told the Oregonian Saturday.

The assayer, who requested that his name and his organization be kept out of it, said a sample from veteran prospector Tom Cronin's claim at Crescent City, given by Cronin to a staff writer of the Oregonian, contained "no gold at all."

His report supported the contention of Dr. John E. Allen, geologist of the Oregon department of geology and mineral industries, that none will strain his back carrying out gold from the "strike"

The gold rush got its start September 14 when Ernest Hey, Dey Norte county assayer, reported that Cronin had struck it rich on the basis of assays performed by Hey with a patented process he discovered.

"When we first heard that the assaying method was by a 'secret method,' we became skeptical and skepticism has increased rather than decreased as more reports have come out of Crescent City," Dr. Allen said.

"That is not good gold mining country, although some traces

Special warning to drivers to be on the alert in the vicinity of schools has been issued by Robert S. Farrell, Jr., Secretary of State.

"This is no routine reminder to drive carefully," said Farrell. "A quarter of a million youngsters are on their way back to school this month. They have to use and cross roadways that are carrying previously unheard of traffic burdens. We Oregonians face what is potentially the most tragic toll of school children in the state's history."

Traffic accidents have taken an unprecedented number of lives in Oregon so far this year. Parents are urged to keep this in mind in seeing that their children go to

and from school safely. Only once has the August 1946 death figure been exceeded in a single month, but authorities fear a high toll of school children may send it soaring to unprecedented heights as classes re-open.
