#### Lived At Smith River Since Her Marriage 60 Years Ago

SMITH RIVER — Mrs. Lillian Morrison, pioneer resident of this area for 60 years, passed away at her home here Monday morning at 5 o'clock, following a heart ailment.

A native of Indiana, Mrs. Morrison came west at an early age with her parents, settling in Curry county. Following her marriage to Allen Morrison, she came to Smith River where she has made her home.

Surviving are four sons: Harold of Lake county, Arthur and Alfred of Smith River, Edward of Eureka; four grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

Her brother, James Smith, died at Eureka, Sept. 20. Mrs. Blanche Stitt of Harbor is an aunt.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon from Smith River Methodist church with Rev. E. C. Hines officiating. Interment was at the family plot at the local cemetery with Roeder Funeral home in charge.
