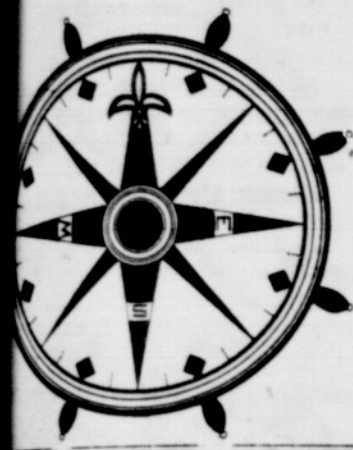
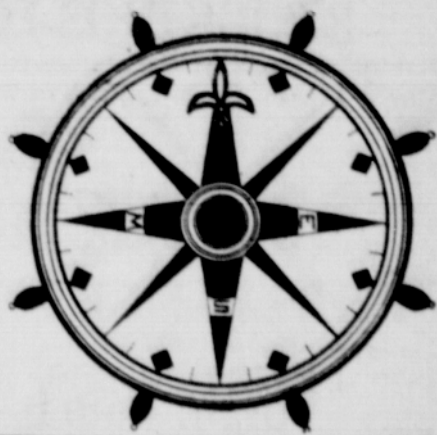

General Held For Goods Victim

General services were held at Astoria, Ore., last Thursday for Benjamin C. Roberts, who was killed while working up the Winemans river earlier in the week. A log rolled on him, pinning him to the ground, and by time his brother, Clyde, who was at work with him, was able to get him from under the log, and a doctor summoned he was past saving and lived but a short time. He died at Coos Bay, Jan. 8, 1897. Roberts lived his entire life on the Oregon coast. He is survived by two children, Colleen, a student at the University of Oregon at Eugene, and Drew of Brookings; his mother, Mrs. Mae Roberts, of Reedsport; a sister, Verna McGregor of Salem; three brothers, Bert, and Clyde of Reedsport, and Clyde of Astoria.
