

Bulb Forcing Key Business. Edgar Kline

Temperatures Must Be Watched For Best Results

Forcing lily bulbs to bring the buds on time for Easter is a task requiring accuracy in timing and judgment in varying temperatures to fit the unusual conditions, good bulbs to start with and especially a pre-arranged period. This is the opinion of Edgar L. Kline, who says that forcing lilies in pot on time for Easter cannot be done successfully in the ordinary window or in living rooms because of the dry air.

The best Easter lilies are said to be grown on a wheelbarrow," Mr. Kline, adding in explanation: "If one house is too warm they are growing too fast for the calendar, they are loaded on a row and trundled to a cool place. When ready to be hurried, they are wheeled back."

Time Given
Previously in a small home, such methods are impossible and instead careful scheduling and temperature control is necessary. Approximate schedule for blooming by Easter, 1947, follows:
Cooling is absolutely essential if bulbs are to bloom at an unnaturally early time of year, instead of the normal time. After the bulbs are obtained from the grower they may be kept four weeks at 65 degrees in ordinary cool storage.
This should bring them to the Nov. 8-15, when they are in storage at less than 50 degrees—36 to 40 is the usual range—for five weeks. In early November they are potted in a mixture of 2 parts garden loam,

two parts peat moss, one part sand, and kept at 55 to 60 degrees temperature. The buds of these should show about six weeks before Easter; if not the heat should be increased.
Plants Need Plenty Water
If lilies are grown too fast, they become drawn, that is, too tall and sappy, or they may do the same thing if too well watered. They need water to keep them growing, but it should not be overdone.
The latter part of the growing may have to be done at a temperature approaching 70. It is better for lilies to bloom in slightly lower temperatures than this, so the flowers will be longer lasting and of better substance. An ideal plant for potted use is short, sturdy and well supplied with buds. For cutting, the plants can be of a taller variety. Plants for cutting or for sale in pots are all grown in individual pots.
