### Your Meat, Soap And Sugar Are Going Away

The New Deal administration which has contrived, with its collectivist controls, to make meat, sugar, soap, and fats scarce in America, has been engaged at the same time in shipping vast quantities of these necessities to foreign nations, a department of agriculture report reveals.

Most of the supplies were given away by UNRRA to Albania, Australia, Byelo-Russia, China, and Czechoslovakia, as well as the

Dodecanese Island, Finland, Italy, Greece, Poland, Ukraine and to Yugoslavia.

These nations received in July and August 102,262,906 pounds of American meat.

They received 4,429,742 pounds of American soap.

They were given 13,167,252 pounds of lard, 6,246,016 pounds of oleomargarine, 2,212,781 pounds of shortening, with smalled quantities of peanut and soybean oil, rendered pork fat, beef suet and tallow.

They received 72,167,056 pounds of sugar—so scarce in America that housewives are not able to can fruit for their families.

Shipments of flour, grain and certain cereal products amounted to 937,205,440 pounds, milk and cheese to 123,920,152 pounds.

In the same two months, the department of agriculture reports tremendous shipments were made to other foreign "claimants"—Britain, Belgium, France, Italy, Greece, the Netherlands, Finland, India, Mexico, Saudi Arabia, China and North Africa.

To these nations went 40,074,739 pounds of meat and livestock products, including millions of pounds of frozen fresh beef, for steaks and roasts, and millions of pounds of frozen fresh pork loins.

They received 35,475,425 pounds of lard.

They also received 1,315,342 pounds of soap.

The generous and human American people are always willing to share with others to prevent distress but there is evidence that great quantities of the supplies shipped abroad by UNRRA do not go to alleviate distress.

They are diverted into black markets in the lands to which they are given, to provide luxuries for the greedy and to enrich thieving officials and criminal bands.

Moreover, the American people should look at their needs first. An American government would put them first.

But the New Deal administration, having demonstrated its indifference to the needs of the American people by unnecessarily depriving them of meat, soap, sugar and other necessities, thru its stubborn maintenance of collectivist controls, now emphasizes its indifference by providing those scarce articles in abundance to her peoples all around the entire world.

The foreign-minded New Deal operates on a policy of America last.
