Robert S. Farrell, incumbent secretary of state, has appealed to voters through newspaper columns, and, from this portion of the state, seems to have no opposition. County offices are uncontested, and each candidate is "practically in."

How many Pilot readers listened to Walter Winchell Sunday night when he did some name-calling of the communistic-minded men already in the nation's congress? It is through the neglect of the citizens of this nation which has permitted such a condition to be in existence today. Stop it by going to the polls next Tuesday, as well as every election coming up in the next few years.

According to Winchell, right in the justice department, communism has gained a foothold which will take plenty of action to dislodge.
