To fill in until a better method may be realized, the local chamber of commerce has started a movement to maintain police and fire protection for this area, areas and boundaries to be determined by the contributors to the fund to be used in payment of such a man or men, picked for the job.

Appointed by President Leo Lucas, this committee is composed of Ed F. Ackley, Roy Wiedemann and Roy Sunderland, to whom the chosen officer will alone be held accountable.

Contributions are expected from the 50-odd businesses of this area, and from such residents of the area, who would like their premises to come under this scope of protection.

Promised every assistance possible by the sheriff's office and the state police, this officer will be able to fill a need of no mean magnitude. Expected of him will be patrolling of the area in the night, there to observe carefully for fires, for any violations of law, and with the right and power to carry on any peace officer's duty.

This man, deputized by the sheriff, will also serve in that capacity in addition to the duties outlined by the committee.

On page nine residents of this area may read the appeal made by the committee, which asks prompt action in returning the blank.

This step, according to the belief of the Pilot, is the first step toward making this community an identity in the county. Addition of this officer would do much toward the peace of mind of the community, as well as to make it a more desirable place in which to live.

Back your chamber of commerce in its endeavor to expand the agricultural facilities of this community. Something for everyone to consider this the possibility of a freezing plant here to care for such other crops which may profitably be grown in this area.

Farm-Job Training Cover Entire State

In the four months since its inception, Oregon's farm-job training program has extended to all counties in the state and on the last day of October, more than 300 World War 2 veterans were working and training in farming procedures while drawing GI subsistence allowances to augment their earnings, Governor Earl Snell said early this week.

O. I. Paulson, director of the state division of vocational education, reported to the governor that the program, initiated last July 1, is growing daily and that the supervision in most sections of the state is adequate now to train as many ex-servicemen as desire to learn farming, either under an employer or on their own farms. Malheur county has more than 60 active trainees, with the prospects of expanding to 150, Paulson said.

Ralph Morgan, who is supervisor of the state vocational agriculture department under Paulson, reported that every trainee gets 200 hours of classwork a year under the vocational agriculture instructor in his district, besides 100 hours of supervision by the instructor right on the farm, all in addition to the time required of the employer to spend with the trainee.

Each county has a local veteran advisory committee which approves those farms where training is desired, and determines if the farm is large enough and has sufficient equipment for training purposes. "This insures the veteran against mere subsidization," Mr. Morgan said.

The local committees are composed of farmers in the area, who are appointed by a state committee of representatives from the various federal agencies. They also approve the wage schedule, which aims toward an objective goal of \$200 and seeks to start the trainee at 50% of this goal, according to Morgan.

Veterans seeking to enter the farm training program should first contact the veterans administration, either in their own areas or by writing the regional office at Portland, for a certificate of eligibility.

After receiving their entitlement (form 1953), the local high school should be contacted and the vocational agriculture instructor, who is hired jointly by the state and school district, will carry on from there.
