

Glover Leads In Bitter Del Norte County Race

CRESCENT CITY — With the counting of ballots following the election, last Tuesday, Charles W. Glover was apparently the winner over his opponent, Frank J. Blackerby.

Glover received a total of 1184 votes to Blackerby's 1083, or a difference of 101 votes.

Out of the 21 precincts, Blackerby carried six, tied in two, with Glover winning in the remaining thirteen precincts.

Still uncounted are 167 absentee ballots, which could affect the outcome. This, however, will mean that Blackerby must obtain 135 of these ballots, with Glover needing but 33.

Mr. and Mrs. Z. Callaway and children have moved from the Ed Hoar ranch, up the Chetco, to a place out of Brookings.

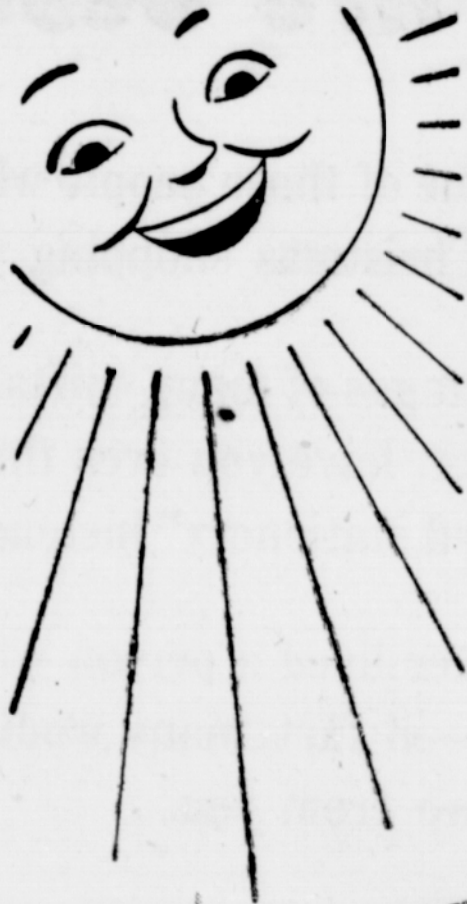
Mr. and Mrs. Eli J. Dessery of
