Kitchen Hints

If soup is too salty, add slices
of new potatoes and boil a few
minutes, until saltiness is reduced
to suit taste. The potatoes may
then be used in many ways.

Save all liquids from mustard
or spaced pickles and use them
in salad dressings or or mixing
with meat for sandwiches.

Save the liquid from pickled
peaches, etc., to be used in those
places where wine was formerly
used, such as mince, pies, sauces.

In cooking vegetables, cover
those that grow under the ground
as turnips, onions, etc., but leave
uncovered those which grow on
top the ground.

When cream will not whip, add
the white of an egg, both being
chilled to same temperature—it
then will whip quite readily.
