Favorite Recipe

Mrs. James Murphy of Harbor gives her favorite recipe this week

MONDAY NIGHT CASSEROLE
2 cups of cooked chicken, veal or other meat, diced.
1 cup diced cooked celery.
1 1/2 cups cooked rice.
1/8 teaspoon pepper.
1 teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons butter.
2 tablespoons flour.
1 1/2 cups chicken broth.

Mix the meat, celery, rice, salt and pepper. Melt the butter, add flour and cook one minute, then add the chicken broth slowly (a can of chicken soup may be substituted) and cook, stirring until smooth. Add the first mixture, pour into an oiled baking dish, cover with buttered crumbs and set aside until 20 minutes before the meal. Bake at 450 degrees, uncovered, to allow crumbs to brown. Will serve six people.
