Area Beckons Money For Investment

Afoot is a survey from which recommendations will be made for growing of new crops in this area, to make it more profitable for growers, and at the same time, get fuller use of land in crop rotations.

Strawberries have been recommended, and already people have come forward with advertisements for plants. Strawberries, here, would be profitable because of the long growing season, and chance to reach the early market, when prices are high.

The extent to which strawberries are grown can determine how new markets may be developed through freezing plants. Such a survey is now being conducted and soon will be released.

Other fields possible here is the re-manufacturing of all wood products, with available timber close at hand. The stands of virgin timber tributary to this part of Oregon means millions of dollars when developed into a going industry.

Material was received this week from Marion Nance, regional forest ranger, and will be published next week. Facts stated in that survey have some amazing facts for capital seeking spot for investment. With building materials as short as they now are, and with the number of homes needed, a 20- or more-year program may be mapped with safety to any investment, it is the belief of the Pilot.

Climatic conditions here are inductive for numerous food crops, and processing plants, if growers may be interested in attempting such a program.

Tourist facilities, if developed here, will make recreation the business with "big money" to be realized from investments. Hollywood is begging for spots such as are seen about here, to come and relax.
