## Favorite Recipe

Mrs. A. V. Muchmore gives her favorite recipe:

**Marshmallow Fudge Cookies**  
2 squares chocolate.  
1 can condensed milk.

Melt over a slow fire, partially cool, add 2 cups sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Cook to soft ball stage.

Remove from fire. Add 3 cups graham crackers, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup walnuts, 24 marshmallows cut into squares. Drop by spoonfuls on baking sheet. No baking necessary.

### PICKLED CARROTS

1 quart vinegar  
1 scant tsp mapeline.  
2 cups sugar.  
1 tablespoon whole cloves  
1 tablespoon allspice.  
1 tablespoon mace.  
Stick cinnamon.

Wash, scrape and cut lengthwise, young tender carrots. Boil slightly in salted water until just tender. Put in jars. Pour over vinegar solution and seal. (can use half recipe if desired).

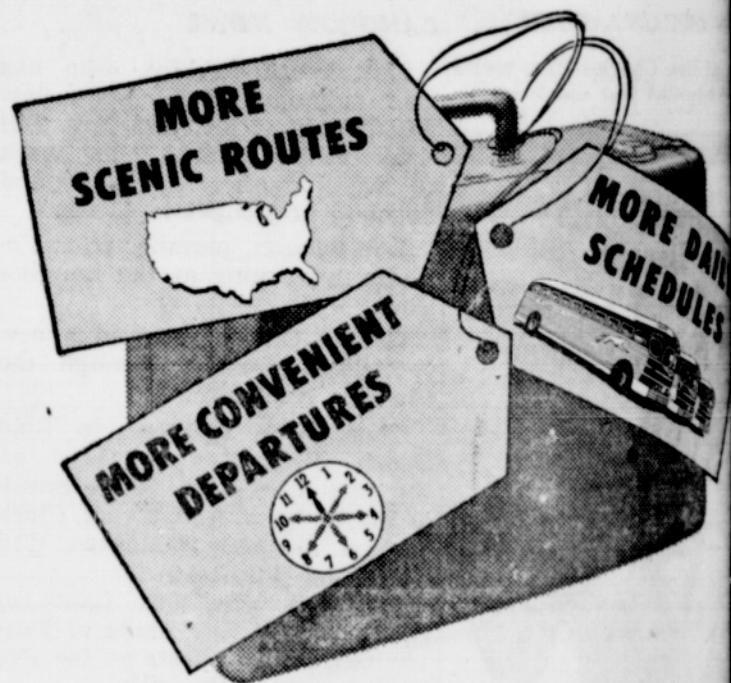
Mr. and Mrs. Arbee ... left Tuesday for Portland to bring back their daughter, who has been confined to the Shrine Hospital.
