And laud your fine art to the sky.

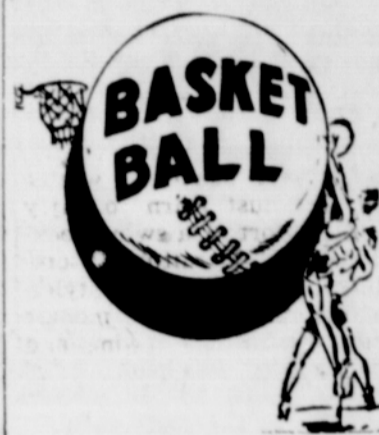

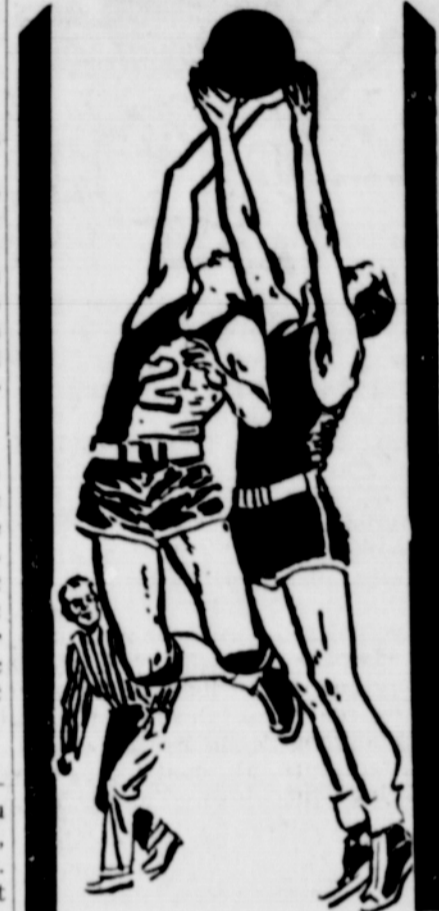
