

Final Rites Held Sunday For Frank James Haight

Large Gathering Pays Tribute To Pioneer Of District

SMITH RIVER—Funeral services were held here Sunday afternoon at 1:30 from the Methodist church for Frank James Haight, widely-known Del Norte citizen who was instantly killed when thrown out of the truck driven by his son, Carlton, Thursday night about midnight, north of Crescent City on highway 101, near Jordan Creek, Rev. E. C. Hicks officiated.

Mrs. William Hall sang "Lead Kindly Light" and "Old Rugged Cross," accompanied at the piano by Mrs. R. D. Rowley.

The church was filled with a large crowd of friends, and many were forced to stand outside.

Mr. Haight, a native of Smith River, was born Oct. 15, 1879, son of Daniel and Fannie Haight, pioneers of the valley. He was 67 years, 2 months and 11 days of age.

He is survived by his widow, Mae, two sons, Carlton and Danny; two granddaughters, Helen and Lois; a brother, Fred; seven sisters, Mrs. Eddie Westbrook and Mrs. Henrietta Woodruff of Smith River; Mrs. Fronia Hursh

of Oregon City; Mrs. Laura Cassidy of Portland; Mrs. Lydia Hursh of Sacramento and Mrs. Letsy Becksted of Carpinteria, Calif. All were present for the funeral except Mrs. Fronia Hursh.

The deceased spent his entire life here, following dairying, except the years he had charge of Del Norte County hospital.

Kitchen Hints

When filling gem or muffin pans leave one of the small sections empty and fill it with water — the gems will never scorch.

In making fruit pies, the sugar should not be put on top, but between two layers of the fruit. Sugar next to the top will toughen it.

When fruit ferments, re-heat it and add a little sugar and make it up into pies and tarts. When jellies ferment, re-heat or melt, add a little sugar and water, then thicken with corn starch for sauce.

When making sandwiches, cut the bread loaf lengthwise instead of crosswise. It saves much of the waste and aids in making fancy sandwiches.

Spinach may be the broom of the stomach, but sauerkraut is the vacuum cleaner.

Meat should be placed in the refrigerator, but not against the ice. Ice always draws out the flavor of any meat pressed up against it.
