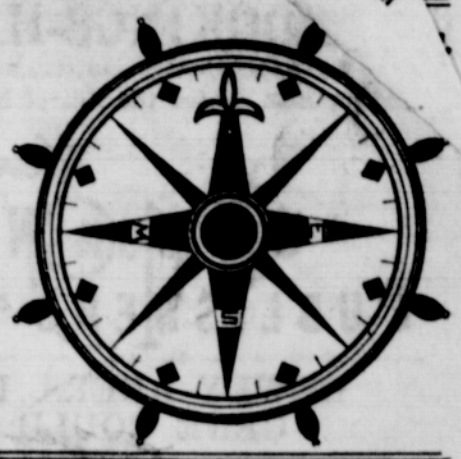

Tentative date for the Curry County Livestock Association's annual meeting has been set for January 13, according to Harvey Crook, president of the association. Postal receipts of Brookings postoffice have increased substantially during the past year, said Mrs. Goldie V. Smith, Saturday morning, in commenting on the progress made in this community during the past year.

Stamp sales of the year, 1946, from January 1 to December 31, were \$6,669.11; while the corresponding period of 1945 were \$5,419.21, representing an increase of \$1,249.90.

The stamp sales of 1940 were \$2,365.21.

While granted through recent supreme court action, this allotment will have to come up before congress at the current session, and may be realized by the end of this year, or early next year, John Van Pelt told the Pilot, Tuesday.

## Prompt Response Sought By Croft Lily Growers Assn. On Crop Survey

In order that a complete survey may be made of Easter lily production in this area, all growers are urged to fill out the questionnaire promptly.

This information is to be used in an effort to obtain a protective tariff so as to prevent foreign lilies coming into this country practically duty-free as at present and flooding the market. United States Senator Guy Cordon of Oregon has promised to introduce legislation in congress to help American Easter lily growers.

This data is also needed for the proposed meeting with the jobbers shortly, at which time the marketing of the 1947 lily crop will be discussed. It is very important that the estimated commercial production for this year be known.
