Kitchen Hints

To prevent corn bread and cakes from a raw taste, mix the meal with milk a few hours before baking the bread; when it is ready to bake, add the salt, egg, a spoonful of flour and last of all the soda, or if sweet milk is used, add baking powder.

If the milk to be used in making baked custard or boiled custard is first scalded and cooled before using the custard will be smoother.

Add one drop of vanilla and beat well just before serving all chocolate and notice the improved delicacy of flavor. The longer chocolate simmers the better it is.

Fish may be scaled, much easier, by dipping them into scalding water for a moment.

After scaling fish and picking ducks, geese, etc., did you ever try rubbing them with a damp cloth, dipped in corn meal? Try it! You will be surprised to see how nicely it cleans them.

When cleansing rice, wash it twice in warm water, which is said to be more effective in re-

moving starch than several washings in cold water.
