Loot Found With Captured Thugs

SMITH RIVER—Capture of the three thugs at North Bend, Ore., recently, it is believed, has solved the robbery of Hight's Store here, by virtue of the three guns found in their car when taken by the state police.

Another identifying clue of the Hight robbery was a pair of socks wrapped in Hight's paper.

According to Mr. Hight, these men had been in the store Thursday afternoon, "casing" the place for the robbery. They made the purchase of the socks at that time.

Last reports indicate that these men had been taken from North Bend to Roseburg, where they are being held in jail in connection with a recent robbery at that place.

Mr. Hight estimates that \$2500 had been taken from his store. The same evening, it is supposed that these same men had robbed Bay Market at Crescent City the same evening.

Entrance to the Hight store was gained by jimmying a rear door.
